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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Narayanrao Rana Mahavidyalaya, Badnera Railway previously known as Arts College Badnera Railway was established and is run by Shri Gajanan Maharaj Shikshan Sanstha Amravati. The college was established on September 26th, 1997 at Badnera Railway, District Amravati in Maharashtra state. It started its first academic session in 1998 - 1999 with 88 students of BA Part 1 on self finance basis. This initiative was taken to cater to the needs of the students in and around Badnera. The economy of this region chiefly revolves around agriculture and agro based work and trades or affairs. In 2008 – 2009 the college started the first academic session of B.Com Part 1 with 15 students on self finance basis. Now our college is a multi faculty, co-education institute. It has been educating female and male students who belong to socially backward, downtrodden and other weaker sections since its inception.

The college became grant-in-aid in 2004 and it is affiliated to Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati. Since 1998 - 1999 the college is aiming to educate youth, women and members from weaker sections in and around Badnera Railway. The College is always focusing, as a mission, on quality education and persistently making efforts to impart higher education to youth residing here. With this mission the college offers a wide range of programs for the students. At present 250 to 300 students are in the mainstream of Higher Education through our institution. These students are being trained by our faculties, three of them working on different University bodies, in academic and other activities that help their overall development.

Establishment of this institution is a step taken as a mission to realize the dream of a great visionary Sant Gadge Baba that was to educate and uplift students from all sections of society. Our college in general and all our faculties, most of them with doctoral degree in particular have been working in this direction for more than two decades.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution has devised a proper planning for effective implementation of curricular activities. The college follows university syllabus and prospectus. The annual plan is worked out through the daily academic diary. Departmental meetings are conducted at regular intervals regarding planning and implementation of the syllabus as per the guidelines of IQAC. We follow the system of syllabus completion, periodic reports. Along with regular classes, the college organises special lectures by various experts for effective curriculum delivery. The college has a provision of special remedial classes for slow learners. Feedback, suggestions and recommendations from the students, teachers, stakeholders and alumni are addressed to the competent authority. Periodical internal assessment like home assignments, class seminars, projects, unit tests, surprise tests, book review, etc. are conducted by the faculty members. The college offered some certificate courses in different subjects. Most of the faculty members have been giving their contribution in paper setting, moderation and valuation work of the university.

Cross cutting issues relevant to gender equality, environment and sustainability, human values and professional ethics are integrated by our institution into the curriculum. Various units in the curriculum cover these mentioned topics. Since the college follows co-education pattern it is necessary to overcome the issue of gender discrimination. Women Empowerment Cell is constituted by the college for this purpose, Environment studies is a part of Curriculum. It is mandatory for the students of 2nd year to pass the concerning examination. Anniversary of national heroes, tree plantation, blood donation, cleanliness drive, social work, etc cover the topics such as human values and professional ethics.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college has a continuous assessment mechanism to enhance learning experience. Student centric methods such as experimental learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used, Extra lectures, classroom interactions, continuous counselling sessions, coaching, personal guidance, study tour and problem solving session are conducted for learners. Guest lectures, essay competitions, singing competition and cultural programs are conducted.

Modern ICT tools are used by the teachers effectively. Teachers prepare PPTs on syllabus and audio, video clips from internet are used for effective teaching. Class tests, unit tests are conducted. Home assignments, seminars, presentations, field works and excursions are arranged. Practical Examination, project work, viva-voce, poster competitions, exhibitions are conducted. The effective implementation of the evaluation and reform in CIE are carried out by the teachers. The college follows transparency in its internal assessment. Department Head monitors internal assessment. The examination committee sorts out grievances related to examination. All the data of examination is computerised and saved for analysis and future reference. The care of academic audit is taken through reviews of teaching learning and evaluation process, Time Table committee, IQAC and the principal monitor implementation with its adherence to the academic calendar.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college provides an opportunity to the students to update their knowledge about recent technologies and changes in the field of agriculture by participating in the concerning workshops. The college motivates the

students to prepare wallpapers, posters for exhibition and participate in quiz and essay competitions. To monitor and address the issues of research, the college has a research promotion system.

To enhance students knowledge various activities like regional visits, guest lectures, essay competitions, training sessions, quiz, poster competitions are regularly organised. Historical and geographical places are also visited time to time, to create awareness about conservation of these places among the students.

Through MoUs with other institutes, the college departments implement various activities like exchange of student's internships, field visits for professional training and research. Having 27 research scholars in it, the college Ph.D, Research Centre becomes a centre of fascination and motivation for the students aspiring to pursue research in future. Besides our history and Marathi faculties 4 more Ph.D supervisors are attached to our research cell. A workshop to prepare an objective syllabus on research methodology was also conducted at the college as a result of which the college faculties have published 23 books and 114 research papers, of them 8 in UGC care list, in National and International journals. The college also seeks pride to have 90% Ph.D holder faculties, most of them being Ph.D supervisors

The college has undertaken various programs to work on Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, AIDS, gender equality etc. A team of committed faculty members and various departments of the college engage students in community development programs such as NSS camp, Social awareness programs, women empowerment, tree plantation, voter's awareness, leprosy eradication, HIV tests, cleanliness of statues, environment awareness, eradication of plastic bags, blood donation camps, yoga and meditation camps, hemoglobin check up, nutrition diet renovation of ancient temples, literacy rally, etc. Relevant programmes are also run by the College Incubation Centre and IPR Cell.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

With a campus spread in large area, the college has its rental building situated in New Town, Badnera. Shri Gajanan Maharaj Shikshan Sanstha, Amravati running this college has recently signed an agreement to purchase one and half acres of land to construct a new college building in near future. The existing college provides and creates adequate learning resources and facilities. Updation and augmentation of infrastructure are done with the financial aid from the parent body as per requirement. Classrooms, administrative office along with principal's office and a Library are well equipped and furnished. ICT facilities with a computer lab are available as an additional teaching and learning facilities. We have 2 ICT Labs Excluding the office, the college has total 8 computers with Wi-Fi facility for academic use. The college gives it's heed to NAAC and IQAC Cell. The college has a spacious playground with games and sports facilities. Ancillary facilities are provided for indoor games

The college library is partially automated from the academic session 2018 – 2019 and is using Integrated Library Management System ILMS with e-granthalaya. It has a learning facility with three computer systems.

The college provides/allocates funds in its annual budget for procurement, up-gradation and maintenance of ICT facilities. The college CDC is the topmost body constituted as per rules and regulations. Utmost importance is given to cleanliness and maintenance of the class rooms, administrative building, toilets and the whole premises.

Student Support and Progression

The college has formed various committees for welfare of students. Women empowerment cell, women redressal committee, career counselling and guidance committee, anti ragging committee are working seriously in this direction through transparent mechanism. Many students get benefited through skill enhancement initiatives such as ICT computing skills, soft skills, language and communication skills, yoga, physical fitness, health and hygiene. Students actively support and offer their participation in organising and arranging different programs and also give their suggestions and demands to the concerning authority. Positive recommendations and suggestions proposed by the alumni are taken into consideration. Alumni also contributes and supports in successful organisation of various events such as blood donation camp, health checkup camp, college annual function, tree plantation and other sports and cultural activities. Many students won awards and medals for their outstanding performance in sports and cultural competitions held at University, National, International levels. As per the existing rules and regulations, government scholarships and free-ships are provided to the needy and eligible students. Concessions and scholarships as per government policies are given to the students. Many of our students are highly benefited through the guidance provided to them about competitive exams by career counselling committee. After graduation, many of our students pursued and are pursuing their post graduation studies. Many students aspiring to seek job in government or in other sectors are well placed in government or corporate or other sectors.

The college has a registered Alumni Association that contributes in a various ways to the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

All the needs of the institution are looked after by the main bodies i.e. the governing body and CDC. These bodies monitor the details of meetings held and the decisions taken by the college development committee regarding finance, infrastructure, appointment, promotion of teaching and non teaching staff, research and extension activities, etc. The issues concerning college development are frequently discussed by the management representatives during their visits.

The institution provides various opportunities for overall growth of students to meet the vision and mission. Faculties have active participation in major decision making bodies like CDC/IQAC there is a liberty for teaching and non teaching staff members to share their suggestions and recommendations in staff council meetings. The decisions of the management are communicated to the staff by the principal. Head of every department is the root level observer having the authority to co-ordinate and to check the academic work. Each department takes it's responsibility to assign teaching workload. Heads provide their support in overall academic works.

Proper initiatives have been taken by the college to render quality to its various units. The perspective plans and policies are prepared. These plans and policies are based on the activities proposed by various departments for the calendar year.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Our college is situated in Amravati Municipal Corporation area. Belonging to nearby villages, most of our students mostly belong to backward communities such as SC, ST, OBC, EBC that increases our responsibility as an institution and governing body. Therefore it is our responsibility to bring them in main-

stream of national education

The college ensures highest priority to safety and security of students, staff and infrastructure of the college. Not a single incident regarding the safety and security of the students ever occurred since establishment of the college. The college organises various programs, activities, seminars under women empowerment committee for generating positive energy and outlook for students' emotional, intellectual social and interpersonal development.

The College campus is always kept clean and waste-free. A concerning committee pays attention towards maintaining expected cleanliness. It resolves issues of cleanliness and waste disposal. We attempt to maintain plastic bag free campus. There is rainwater and waste water harvesting system in the college and a bore-well is used for maintaining greenery in the campus. The college also has a system to recycle organic waste. Attempts have been made to save energy through use of low power consuming appliances like LED bulbs, tube lights, etc. By celebrating anniversary of great personalities, attempts are made to cultivate their thoughts among the students. Complete transparency is maintained while conducting different auxiliary functions. Keeping in view healthy citizens as an asset, the college implemented two best practices namely health awareness programs and environment awareness programs with a vision "Better Environment for Better Tomorrow".

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

All the departments apply traditional, ICT base and student centric method in the teaching and learning process that helps the holistic development of the students. While teaching a particular subject, basic concepts of the topic are explained in classroom teaching. Short notes and important points are given so as to clear the ideas of students. This methodology helps to understand the subject comprehensively. Secondly Question- Answer method has been applied in the classroom teaching. It encourages the student to ask question and also clears their doubts. In regular classroom teaching teachers use experimental learning, classroom seminars, group discussions, project works and field visits. Geography and Home-Economics departments conduct laboratory experiments. Knowledge corner and News paper cuttings are

regularly run by the department of political science to keep students updated about political news. Visits to old age home, Place of Scheduled Tribe and other social and historical sites by departments like political science, history and geography offer genuine experience to the learners. Study tours encourage participation of students. Assignments, group discussion, seminar, debates, quizzes, exhibitions, case studies etc are conducted by the various departments. Extra curriculum activities are regularly conducted by the college NSS, culture committee and department of sports. We have four colour holders in sports in last five years. Extra curriculum activities, sports and cultural activities help in developing the overall personality of the students.

For effective teaching learning process we have adopted innovative teaching methods beside the traditional teaching learning methods. E-learning resources are frequently used by teachers for the effective transfer of knowledge. The college has two ICT enabled classroom. All the teachers make use of the ICT tools in teaching. Most of the teachers prepare PPT and present on projector. Judicious use of social media like WhatsApp, YouTube are also made for the easy transfer of information. Seminars and paper presentations on projector are also conducted for the benefit of the students. The college also organizes technical workshops, guest lectures and guidance for professionals in this context. The college has signed MOUs with some NGOs.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Several initiatives have been taken by Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, from time to time to upgrade and enhance examination reforms and develop the skilled minds and hands. The university introduced the semester system (SCGS) from the academic year 2017-18 for BA part 1 course. The semester system with CGPA pattern has been adopted by our parent University and from 2022 - 23 CBCS pattern has been adopted.

At the beginning of every year teachers devote initial lectures on introducing the examination pattern and evaluation system. Our institute has been making continuous efforts to enhance qualitative assessment. Each department with the support of the examination department has adopted a continuous internal evaluation process. Institute follows rules and regulations of Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati for assessment and evaluation. The summative exams of it's semester of course as English, English Literature, Marathi, Marathi Literature, Sociology, Political Science, Economics, History has 80% weightage to the theory and the remaining 20% weightage has been given to internal assessment. Geography and Home economics are practical subjects giving 30% weightage to the practical.

The following measures have been implemented

- Teaching plan prepared by every faculty.

- Class test, unit test conducted
- Beside this, open book test, surprise test, home assignment, seminars, quizzes, presentation and field works are arranged to test the level of learning
- As well as viva-voce, practical examination, project work, poster competition, exhibitions are conducted every year.
- College examination committee is formed for the smooth conducting and to monitor.
- The record of the internal assessment is maintained by the respective departments.
- Examination committee is constituted in college to look after college examination. It maintains the whole record of question papers, marksheets, attendance etc
- The institution monitors the progress and performance of students through academic performance participation in co curricular and extra curriculum activities.
- The academic performance of the students is monitored by observing the student's performance in classroom through discussion, interaction, group discussion, presentation, class seminar, PPT presentation and internal examination.

There is a mechanism to deal with examination related grievances which is transparent, time bound and efficient. The officer incharge has been appointed and examination committee is formed to monitor and supervise examination related activities. The committee meets frequently to discuss various issues including redressal of grievances. In case of any grievances a student submits written application in details. The grievances regarding the entry of marks, mistakes in name, passing rules etc are resolved immediately by verifying the records.

- If the students have any difficulty in filing up examination form, the grievance of the concerned student is solved by the office.
- In case of short falling in the incentive marks of sports, cultural activities, NSS, blood donation and internal, practical marks office staff personally looks into the matter and set the issue in a right way.
- Officer in charge of examination handles all grievances pertaining to the examination and the same are communicated to affiliated university through the principal.
- The grievances pertaining to examination are immediately settled by the examination committee

Incubation Centre is established in the college in the chairmanship of principal of the college to promoting An Entrepreneurial Mindset. NRM is continually motivating students to become Entrepreneur. This Center is guiding students for Entrepreneurship & Start -up. Incubation Centre has organized workshop on the entrepreneurship & start-ups. Guidance of the renowned industrialist is taken in this regard.

Intellectual Property Right (IPR)- An Intellectual Property Right (IPR) Cell has been formed at Narayanrao Rana Mahavidyalaya to impart knowledge to the students of the college about IPR, Copy Rights and Trade mark. IPR Cell is established in the college in the chairmanship of principal of the college. IPR cell has organized two Guest lecture on the concept of Intellectual property rights and the concepts of Trademark and Copyright.

Collaboration- Collaborative research partnerships with academic institutes are encouraged and fostered. Industrial visits for students and faculties, field and site visits of students, expert lectures by industry personals for students will be organized for students. Mahavidyalaya has also done a collaboration between College of Social Work Badnera for Inter Library Loan Services through which books can be

transferred among the colleges.

Research- The institute has a well-defined and published research promotion ideas. Faculty members are encouraged to do research on various contemporary subjects and which will be fruitful for society and helpful for research scholars. College have established Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University approved Research Centre in History and Marathi. through this centre research supervisors are attached from various subjects and institutions. 27 students have registered for Ph D programs and the numbers are increasing every year. Faculty from college have published 114 research papers in peer reviewed journals and 8 papers in UGC CARE listed journals. 23 Books of faculties are published with ISBN Number. 15 chapters in books are published. 16 conference proceedings. Research tours and visits of the research scholars is taken for the on the site experience.

The activities carried out by the Incubation Centre was very much helpful for the students to make them aware regarding entrepreneurship. The guest lecture of renowned industrialist open up the new horizon in this field. Guest lecture on Intellectual Property Rights also was also helpful to understand the new concepts of copyrights and trademark. Total 08 CCTV Cameras have been provided in the college premises to curb ragging security and to stop malpractices. The seminar hall is generally/widely used for cultural and other programs. Some faculties use the ICT Room for presenting seminars and teaching-learning process. Apart from this, a total 08 computers are available in the college. IQAC cell caters to the educational and administrative needs of the students and staff. Dustbins are kept in the college premises, administrative office, staff room, girls common room, examination department, washroom, and in all departments to maintain cleanliness.

The college has provides clean drinking water. An aqua purifier water is also available for students. The library is rich in its repository, on date 2439 books (Text Books & Reference Books) and 05 periodicals are available to cater to the needs of students.

Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff:

The institution has been strictly following UGC's (PBAS) Performance Based Appraisal System for the teaching staff since it was implemented in 2010. The teachers filled their PBAS forms by the end of every academic session and filed them in the college office. These Self-Performance Based Appraisal System performs are scrutinized by screening committee every academic year. After verification by the Principal and Office Superintendent, these forms are used for the placement and promotion of the teachers for Career Advancement Scheme. The placement committee, consisting management representative, Vice-Chancellor nominees, Subject experts and state government representative, revived these forms of all the teachers who are placed for Career Advancement i.e. AGP 6000 to 7000, AGP 7000 to 8000, AGP 8000 to 9000 for Associate Professors and AGP 9000 to 10000 for Professor Grade. their Self- Performance Based Appraisal System forms. It plans for development of quality parameters for the various academic and administrative activities. It monitors teaching learning, evaluation and research promotion. It coordinates between the management, the principal, the staff and the students. It has been striving hard for upgrading the academic, infrastructural and all support facilities in the institute to cater the needs of students. It has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes.

Two best practices institutionalized as a result of IQAC initiatives:

1. Use of ICT Aids: In the initial stage the IQAC prepared the academic calendar and then prepared the timetable as per the workloads. The academic diaries maintained by the faculties. The IQAC inspires the teaching faculties to provide computerised study materials to the students. They prepared advanced and slow learner lists and organised special programs for them. Some faculty used various apps and Google products for teaching learning process. Some faculty launched online Pre-Aptitude for the First Year students. The faculty applied the ICT tools and created teaching materials.

2. Implementation of Green Practices in the Campus:

The rapid urbanization and economic development at local, regional and global level has led to several environmental and ecological crises. So the IQAC proposed to initiate various green practices to

maintain eco-friendly college campus through the activities i.e. Tree Plantation, Paperless Work, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Plastic Eradication, Earth day, Prog., International Yoga day, Clean and Beautiful Campus, Save Power. For the better implementation of green practices, IQAC distributed these activities to the various departments. Department of NSS and Sports units maintained clean and beautiful college campus. Because of these practices, eco-friendly and pollution-free college campus and social awareness about renewable energy and e-waste management is developed among the students and the community. Also IQAC took initiatives for rainwater harvesting and it worked properly and increased the level of ground water.

Environment awareness

2. Context

The rural village region and green landscaping of college are the necessary features for shaping and sustaining an eco friendly.

3. The practice

1. Plantation

Every year trees are planted in the college and nearby villages by the students as well as by the children of the area to create awareness about the environment among the children. Every year about 100 samplings are planted and maintained by our staff members and students.

2. Organizing workshops

This college organized a workshop to make Ganesha idols made of eco-friendly clay, and to use natural colors instead of chemical colors while celebrating Holi. Students were also given knowledge on how to create seed ball and how to plant it. Along with this, a workshop was organized to make paper bags.

3. Leaflet distribution

In order to create awareness among the common people about the environment, leaflets were distributed in various villages.

4. Water conservation projects

Under 'Pani Adva- Pani Jirwa' every year water conservation work is done.

5. Conducting lectures

On the occasion of Ozone Day, Vasundhara Day, World Environment Day, World Water Day, Chimney Day, various lectures were organized in the college.

6. Organizing the tour and various competitions

Slogan competitions, quizzes and an educational tour is organized every year in the college.

7. Work for livestock

During summers, when the animals do not get water, arrangements are made by the students of the college in their homes for the birds and panavathas were prepared in the college and other villages to provide water to animals. A system for Party Water for birds arranged by reusing plastic bottles.

8. Plastic elimination programme

Under the plastic elimination programme, plastic was collected from pilgrimage Kondeshwar, the college premises, Mill chawl area, government hospital, bus depot and a rally was organized

Evidence of success

1. Through the various activities students are made aware of environmental issue.
2. Environment awareness helps students understand how their decisions and actions affect the environment.
3. Through periodical tree plantations, flora and fauna on the campus have been enriched.

Health awareness program

Objectives of the practice

The context

Our college students are from very rural areas. Those students do not know about diet and health. Therefore, it has become more important to monitor the health of students. Due to the growth of consumer society and environmental pollution, students are one of the most vulnerable groups, who face a certain amount of negative changes. At the same time, there is a dirty settlement around the college. There is no health awareness among the people there. Therefore, it is very important to create public awareness about health among the students in the college and in the locality. If we develop an interactive Health Awareness system that would teach the students about health consciousness, we would be able to make the students aware of healthy food life style.

Practice

1. Programs to create drug free and healthy environment

To create healthy atmosphere and awareness programmes. On cleanliness, spread of Dengue-Malaria, blood donation camp alongwith planting of medicinal plants in the college premises are regularly organized. An Oath to lead drug free life is also administered to the students.

2. Covid-19 related practice

Public awareness was created in the society about Covid-19 through street plays, pamphlets, lectures. Simultaneously, 1000 masks of N95 were distributed by students from village to village. Vaccination camp was organized in the college. Special funds for Corona were deposited with the Government of Maharashtra.

3. Programs on women's health

Women's health is being neglected due to society's customs, traditions, superstitions, lack of medical facilities and neglect of personal health. The prevalence of the disease is increasing among women. Therefore, lectures on women's health and daily diet are organized in the college, hemoglobin test, nutrition chart information, distribution of iron medicines, physical performance test of girls, medical test are conducted.

4. Programs on Yoga

Yoga is essential for all-round improvement and intellectual development such as health, peace of mind, personality development, morality. For this, programs like lectures, quiz, surya namaskar, physical ability test of student are conducted in the college.

Evidence of success

With a view to improve awareness a series of lectures organized on yoga, women health, Covid -19, healthy food etc. have been taken up to spread the message of prevention and promotion of health through wellness practice throughout the year. Student also participate in health awareness program and also yoga programs. This consciousness in the students community is looking towards more and more success.

Problems encountered and resources required

1. Dealing with different people, adapting to change and keeping people motivated are universal challenges face in any program.
2. Women and girls in rural areas are not ready to tell about the disease.
3. Poverty is a major obstacle to obtaining a nutritious diet.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Our college was established in the year 1998. It has been working for the educational, social and economic development of students for last 25 years. Although the college is located in an urban area, most students are children of rural farmers, farm laborers.

Therefore our students are economically weaker, and share economical responsibility of their families, hence they cannot take their education regularly. We are trying to bring them into main stream of education.

We think our college should not only be a centre of formal education but it should also inculcate human values among people of this region.

A number of innovative activities undertaken by the college clearly show institutional distinction such as: Teacher-student relationship, sports facilities, visits to nomadic settlements and old age homes, guidance for competitive examinations, guidance for female education and pre-marital counseling etc.

Parents in rural areas are not very keen on sending girls for education but the enrollment of girls in our colleges is more than boys. The effort of our college is to develop self confidence in girls. Most of the girls are anaemic so we arrange camp of hemoglobin test and physical efficiency test, give them medicine and also guide about diet. Along with this, self-defense training (Lathi - Kathi) for girls is provided in the college. For the safety of girls, the college also has CCTV cameras.

Along with academic development of students, various sports are also given priority in the college for physical development. For this, sports equipments and playgrounds are available in the college. The sports equipments and playgrounds are also used by students from other colleges. This initiative taken by our Physical Education department provides financial as well as sports facilities to the students. Students of various colleges practice kho-kho and volleyball on the field every day. The college received four colour holders in sports in last five years. Students have participated in international level sports such as Judo-Karate, Powerlifting, Running. Total 33 students have participated in various sports at state and national level.

Students need specialized guidance in various subjects to survive in today's competitive era. Guidance is provided by college teachers as well as expert guides for competitive exams. Political events items are discussed daily by the Political Science Department and daily important news are displayed on the 'Knowledge Corner' board. It definitely benefits all students. Many students have achieved good results in competitive exams. To remove fear of examination the students are counseled about the examination and if there are any problems regarding the result, they are resolved by the Examination Grievance Redressal Committee and the students are guided in this regard from time to time.

The college tries to create social awareness and a sense of responsibility among the students. For this, places like settlements of nomadic tribes and old age homes are visited. At the same time, the college tries to spread the thoughts of different saints and social reformers in the society through various programs on cleanliness, environmental protection, gender equality etc.
